## **Basic Needs Center**

Sometimes, being a student can be challenging! Challenges might include finding childcare, looking for new employment, paying bills, buying groceries, or even finding a new place to live. Fortunately, as a Cuesta student, you have resources available to help you!

### What does the Basic Needs office do?

The Basic Needs office is here to support students who are struggling to stay in school or do well in school because of life events happening outside of school. For example, students might be experiencing houselessness or food insecurity. Or they might be balancing their role as sole caregiver for a child or family member with the demands of student life in higher education.

### Who can access the services?

All currently enrolled Cuesta students are potentially eligible for Basic Needs services which include connections to on- and off- campus services for long-term stability as well as short term support like food, hygiene items, gas money, and more.

#### How can students access the services?

Students can fill out a Basic Needs support form to be added to this term's cohort. They can also meet with Jack to talk about their unique situation and how Basic Needs may be able to help.

The event aimed to share important immigration information with Cuesta students and members of the community.

Students listened to a presentation by Gerson Cortes the cofounder of UndocuScholarsLLC. The presentation by Mr. Cortes addressed common myths regarding immigration and undocumented individuals and provided the audience with accurate information on this topic.

Additionally, ESL students learned about community organizations that will support them and their families. These organizations included the County of San Luis Obispo, Community Health Centers (CHC), and San Luis Obispo Legal Assistance Foundation, all of which were present at the event.
